Keys to Language Learning

USING ORAL HISTORIES and WRITING to Build Literacy Skills

I know some of our tutors have used oral histories to get their students writing and communicating about family history. Why not try it yourself? This is an excellent way to generate conversation before students begin writing as you discuss questions the student may want to use to interview family members. The student will have a chance to practice note-taking and then start to develop paragraphs. For lower-level students, make a simple timeline for recording significant life events. This is a project that you can revisit as the student learns editing and revision skills. The tutor gains from learning more about the student's background. Our students tend to have fascinating histories, immigrant or not.



Federal, state and local funds combined for adult literacy (ESL and GED) are:

- Less than one-twentieth of higher education funding
- Less than one-tenth of K-12 funding
- Less than one-eighth of Head Start funding
- Less than one-twelfth Early Head Start funding

Adult ed funding serves about 3 million of the 93 million adults who could benefit from services, or three percent of the adults in need. The U.S. spends a fraction of the funding that goes to schools and colleges on adult education. And there's been a 17 percent drop in funding since 2002. On top of that, the 2013 sequester imposed another 5 percent cut in adult education monies. From NPR:

MANGO



If you live in Astoria or have a library card for the Astoria Library there is a language-learning resource available at the Astoria Public Library. It's called **Mángo** and can be accessed online from home. There is even a mobile app available for smart phones and tablets. Mángo has English for Spanish speakers (instructions in Spanish) and Spanish for English speakers (instructions in English). There are other languages available for study, too. Please inform your students about this free resource. Let me know if you need help getting started with it.

You cannot use a Passport Card (a sharing agreement among local libraries if you already have a CCC library card) because the licensing agreement doesn't accommodate this.

Remember: all literacy tutors get a free CCC library card.
