State and Federal Reporting Requirements: The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

Funding for the literacy program is determined by student success in four areas. Firstly, the student must have taken a **pre-test** upon entry to the program. Secondly, the student must complete **40/60 hours** of study (depends on the test) during the course of the year. Thirdly, the student must complete a **post-test** after the 40 hours has been reached and fourthly, the post test must show a **level gain**.

All students have a pretest before meeting their tutor. Difficulties in meeting these goals largely rest with the students' inability to reach the 40-hour mark and then to make a level gain on the post-test. As you know, life circumstances often prevent the student from keeping his/her appointment. Sometimes our students leave town unexpectedly and administering a second test is impossible. Making gains on the tests often represent an unrealistic goal for our students, but in general, students who are

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TUTOR TIPS OF THE MONTH

1. Student Resumes and Interview Techniques

One of the main goals of the literacy program is to better prepare our students to compete in the workplace. For our more advanced students who are looking for work or for a change of jobs, we can assist them by completing resumes and practicing interview dialogs. We distributed materials to start the process at the last tutor appreciation lunch. If you weren't there, please give us a call. 2. Lesson Ideas from Gerry S.

Gerry works with a low-level ESL student who is making some remarkable progress. Following are two lesson ideas she has employed to good effect.

- Help your student design a questionnaire to interview a family member or friend about their life story. The interview can be conducted in Spanish, but the student will produce written responses in English. If writing isn't an option, an oral accounting of the information, followed by a tutor-produced script, is another option.
- A good idea to teach directions and map knowledge is to ask the student to give directions to their home, or some other landmark in the area. Provide and discuss appropriate vocabulary first-north, south, etc, turn right, go left, block, etc). Drawings can be put to good use here.
- Please send ideas and suggestions of the techniques you've used with your student to share with the other volunteers.

Let's talk about hours accumulated, and how we can help the student improve test scores, if the 40-hour mark seems possible to achieve. No post-testing will be done until after April 1 to ensure this test can be used to begin the next program year- July 1, 2011 through June 2012. 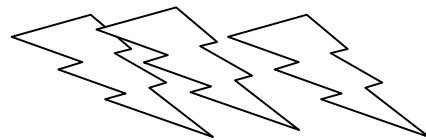
