The CCC Foundation Board approved a \$7,000 request from the college to help purchase food items from the *Student Success Fund*.




## CCC MERTS DOCK REPAIRS

The training vessel *M/V Forerunner* had been docked in Warrenton due to the need to repair the dock at the MERTS campus. Thanks to the partnership between the CCC Foundation and the College, three pilings at the dock were replaced and the gangway attachment to the dock stabilized. The total project was approximately \$30,000. The CCC Foundation Board approved a request of \$12,600 to complete the necessary repairs.

# MOTORSPORT MUSEUM LEAVES LASTING GIFT

Oregon car enthusiasts lost a treasure last spring when the World of Speed motorsport museum in Wilsonville closed its doors. Though sadly another victim of COVID-19, the **World of Speed is leaving a lasting legacy by giving departing gifts to schools and nonprofits across the state.**

With the dissolution of the organization, their board of directors agreed that the **museum's assets would be distributed to 501(c)(3) museums and schools** allowing World of Speed's collection to live on for future generations. A total of 51 entities received donations from World of Speed, with Clackamas and Clatsop community colleges splitting the cash funds. **Each college received a \$375,000 donation through their colleges' foundations to benefit ongoing education of automotive technology.** The colleges also received some physical donations from World of Speed.

Clatsop Community College will use their portions of the donation for student scholarships in the college's automotive programs. **Clatsop Community College Automotive Instructor Thad Nolan** knows how important this is for the automotive program, industry and the community in general. ***"This will open up more opportunities for students who want to get into an industry that not only is hurting for skilled workers, but is an essential part of everyday life,"*** he stated.

## Why Endow a Scholarship Fund?

The Foundation raises funds annually to cover operating expenses and provide needed financial support for the college and its students. For example, and as mentioned in this newsletter, the Foundation provided seed money for the new student food pantry and repairs for the MERTS dock in furtherance of the marine learning center. What these two expenditures have in common is filling a college and student need that is not normally included within the regular annual budgeting process for the college. While these targeted expenditures are critical aspects of the Foundation's mission, providing student scholarships is truly the core and that's where endowments play a critical role.



Endowments are simply a way to provide funds for something or someone (i.e., "*she tried to promote the endowment of a Professor Chair of nursing or student nursing scholarships*"). The Foundation currently manages over \$4 million in endowments and distributes about 5% annually toward student scholarships. The Foundation's endowment funds are invested in various assets such as stock index funds, real estate funds, bonds and individual stocks all managed by Ferguson Wellman, a Portland-based investment management company. **Our objective is to sustain and grow the endowments entrusted to us so they may provide student scholarships indefinitely.**

Endowment agreements can take many forms depending on the wishes of the donor. Endowments are an opportunity to make a lasting and meaningful impact on the lives of deserving students. For administrative reasons the Foundation sets a **minimum \$25,000 to establish an endowment**; however, there is no maximum amount and an endowment can be funded currently or through as an estate bequest. Of course, there are tax savings opportunities to charitable donations that should be given consideration in consultation with your financial or legal advisors. And, for older donors, remember you can make charitable contributions directly from your IRA, which is especially important for Individuals with larger IRAs.

## Establish an endowed fund with the CCC Foundation
