College Now & Coastal Commitment Dual Credit

This handbook is designed to familiarize you with the opportunities that our Dual Credit programs offer. The Handbook will discuss how to participate in the programs. It is designed to answer student and parent questions about the requirements, expectations, procedures, and services available through CCC's Dual Credit programs. What is Dual Credit?

Dual Credit Programs allow students to take college-level academic coursework while enrolled in high school. Through an annual agreement between Clatsop Community College and regional high schools in Clatsop and neighboring counties, students are enrolled in high school classes that have been approved by CCC to provide college credit. When a class is approved for college credit, it means there will be additional work and a higher standard applied to the course material. It is worth all the work, and we hope that the experience helps you see yourself as a future full-time college student.

College Now (CTE) and Coastal Commitment dual credit courses are taught at high schools by high school faculty and give both high school and college credits that may be transferable to other colleges and universities.

Oregon Law supports Dual Credit programs. The law that pertains is:

OAR 715-017-005-Dual Credit which means secondary and postsecondary credit awarded for a course offered in a high school, which course is sufficiently similar to the college or university course as to enable the enrolled student to be described as taking the course from an Oregon community college or public university as set forth in ORS 340.310 The course must be taught by a high school teacher who has been approved by the college or university and who meets the qualifications to teach the course for the college or university. Dual Credit may include Career and Technical Education courses.

Dual Credit courses are a fantastic opportunity for high school students to earn free college credits while attending high school. The CCC Dual Credit program offers:

- Academic options for students who are considering college classes after graduating from high school.
- A chance to explore college-level work while in high school.
- Shortens the time required to complete a certificate program, an associate's degree, or a bachelor's degree.
- Reduced the cost of post-secondary education.
- Reduce taking courses with the same materials in high school and college.
- Explore what career fields the student is interested in.

Credits with a Purpose

Clatsop Community College believes in credits with a purpose for all our dual credit students. Students who do well learning about how to navigate a college credit course learn skills that benefit them throughout their college and career time management, critical thinking skills, and meeting deadlines. By focusing on critical skills in writing and math, they are better able to navigate the rigors of higher learning in other college courses.

Why Dual Credit?

- Students and families can save money by earning FREE college credit. Clatsop Community College does not charge tuition or fees to be part of the program. (Please note there may be a cost from your high school; please check with your high school.)
- Earn college and high school credit at the same time. We have had students earn their associate's degree by the time they graduate from high school.
- Learning to transition to college study
- Earn college credits while students are concurrently enrolled in high school.
- Get a head start on earning a college-level Certificate, associate's degree, or bachelor's degree, and graduate early and enter your career field.
- Become aware of career opportunities through college courses and resources.
- Receive specialized academic education to better prepare for entry-level employment and career achievement.
- You and your family see you as a college student!
- Your college credits never disappear!

We have both lower division transfer and Career & Technical Education credits that transfer into degrees and pathways to help students move into a career field.

Getting Started in Dual Credit

When you register (Google Form) for a Dual Credit class, you are a college student! This handbook provides an overview of the college systems and services so you can begin to understand what it means to be a college student. The Dual credit experience can help you discover important skills and services available to be a successful college student, such as the college library, Patriot Hall- gym, fitness, and tutoring labs. Dual Credit Programs

There are two dual credit programs offered at Clatsop Community College for Oregon high school students.

College Now- Primarily Career and Technical Education classes

Coastal Commitment- Primarily Lower Division Transfer classes

Both types of Dual Credit offer college-level credits for approved high school classes.

There are two additional programs that high school students can participate in to gain college credit- Simultaneous Enrollment and Running Start. Student Qualifications:

To participate in dual credit classes, a high school must:

- Be interested in exploring an academic program or career from the viewpoint of a college student.
- Be informed by their counselor and instructor of specific course prerequisites and course completion requirements.
- Be willing to conform to all codes of conduct stipulated by the high school and CCC, including those regarding cheating, plagiarism, and honesty.

Students with short and long-term accessibility needs may receive appropriate, reasonable accommodation through consultation with their high school instructor and /or counselor and in communication with the CCC Director of Student Access Services. Documentation of a disability or accessibility need must be provided before testing or course completion.

Registering for a Clatsop Community College Dual Credit:

1. Contact your high school counselor for information about College Now and/or Coastal Commitment class offerings, including schedule requirements and textbooks.
2. Complete any required placement tests and /or meet all prerequisites before registration. Students needing to complete placement tests should contact their high school counselor about the possible availability of testing at their high school.
3. Enroll in both the high school class and the CCC class. A special college registration (Google) form is available when registering for a dual credit class. Your high school instructor, counselor, and /or a designated school representative will provide the necessary registration documents.
4. Students may also need to purchase a textbook(s) for the course, if required. Students should check with their local high school counselor and/ or instructor regarding specific information about this.
5. From your high school instructor, pay close attention to all course and classroom procedures and expectations because they may vary from course to course. Make

sure you understand the specific completion requirements (E.G., some courses may require a placement test, additional work beyond regular school assignments, or attending extra classes not included in the standard school schedule and calendar).

6. Individual dual credit instructors will distribute class policies and syllabi during the first week of class, detailing individual class requirements. Students will be expected to perform at the college level to honor all deadlines declared by the instructor or Clatsop Community College. Students should consult with their instructor and /or counselor as soon as possible if they want to consider dropping or withdrawing from their class. All dropped or withdrawn classes need to adhere to published college withdrawal dates.
7. Student grades will be submitted to CCC by the high school instructor at the end of the term for the course. Grades are available on the posted date following the end of the term the course finishes. The current academic dual credit calendar reflects those dates.

When you have completed the course, your grade will be submitted to CCC by your high school instructor, and you will have earned both High school and College Credit!

Dropping or Withdrawing from a Course

If you drop your high school class, you will also be responsible for dropping the college class as well. Simply dropping the high school class does not remove you from your college registration. You need to officially withdraw from your class through the college. If you do not withdraw from your class through the college, an “F” will appear on your college transcript as the grade for the class. To prevent an “F” or failing grade, contact your counselor and/or instructor as soon as possible for instructions about dropping or withdrawing from a class. The college requires that all drops or withdrawals from classes take place by a particular date during the term. College Grades, Transcripts & Transferring Credits

Dual Credit grades are recorded on the student’s official academic record at CCC. Student transcripts are available for viewing online anytime through CCC’s website at no cost to the student. Students may view online anytime through CCC’s website at no cost to the student. Students may view grades or print unofficial transcripts by accessing CCC’s website and following these procedures:

Find your Grades:

Once you are registered for courses you will receive an email to your personal email with your CCC email and password. with a address. and sent a password from CCC.

Go to the CCC website in the left-hand corner of the main website and click on “MY CCC”

Log into your my CCC student portal with your CCC email and password that was sent, from here you can see your schedule, and unofficial transcripts.

Your username will be:

The password is a randomly generated password was emailed to you. If you need help resetting your password contact firststop(503-338-2411, rjohansen@clatsopcc.edu or helpdesk@clatsopcc.edu. You will need to provide your date of birth on your request.

You may change this password once you have logged in for the first time.

Once signed in, your student record information is available. Click on “unofficial transcript” to view your grades. You should be able to print your unofficial transcript from this page.

Alternatively, you may get a copy of your unofficial transcript by emailing firststop@clatsopcc.edu. Please include your date of birth in your email with the request. Or you may visit the CCC First Stop located in Columbia Hall, Room 109 at the Clatsop Community College Lexington Campus.

Official Transcripts:

Information about requesting an official transcript is available on the CCC website, under the heading of Admissions and Records and then Transcript Request. You will find helpful information about the procedure to request official transcripts and any fees associated with the request. Official transcripts are typically required when students apply to colleges and universities other than CCC.

The primary process of requesting official transcripts uses an electronic request through parchment.com

Official transcript requests cost \$5.00 per copy.

Transferring Credit:

To transfer your college credits to another college or university, students need to request that an official CCC transcript be sent to that college or university by following the instructions above.

Campus Services:

CCC Dora Badollet Library: Has both in-person and online resources for all CCC students. How to log in to your CCC library account and renew materials. Accessing your library account is easy and fun.

Start at the Dora Badollet Library webpage: clatsopcc.edu/library

You can access the library catalog of holdings by clicking the “Online Catalog—Library Account Access” button under the Books & DVDs tab in the central search hub. Alternatively, you can get to the catalog from the “Library Quicklinks” area on the left.

There is a link in this section to Login/Renew Items. Both methods lead you to Koha, the catalog that shows books, DVDs, and other physical objects held at the Dora Badollet Library as well as the other libraries in the Chinook Library Network.

On the right-hand side of the screen is the log-in area.

Your user login is all seven digits of your student number. Example: 6908421

Your password is your last name. Example: Bob Jones would be jones

You can change your password if you want to, but we will not be able to help you recover it. We can change it back to your last name upon request.

Once you log in, you can see what you have checked out and your due dates. You can also renew items up to three times by clicking the box by the item and pressing “Renew.”

Tutoring:

All registered Clatsop Community College, Adult Basic Skills/GED, Dual Credit and Simultaneous Enrollment students (that means you are in high school taking college classes also) can receive free tutoring for all academic courses through the Tutoring Center.

Tutoring is a quarter-long, weekly commitment and represents an agreement between students, tutors, and the college to determine appropriate assistance to help students reach their academic goals.

Tutoring Options for All Academic Courses

Tutoring is available most days and times of the week. Once matched with a tutor you will determine the best days and times to meet.

*Some programs have a schedule that fluctuates weekly, in which case you will meet for a determined block of time, but on different days at various times.

Online or in person?

This is decided together with your tutor. Most tutors are available both in person and online over Zoom. If you prefer to meet only in person or online, please note that when you [request a tutor](#). The tutoring center will strive to match students with someone available in that format.

Group or One-on-One?

Both group study sessions and one-on-one tutoring are available for students. Let us know what your preference is when you [request a tutor](#). The tutoring center will do its best to match you with someone who can provide that format.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQS)

What are the names of the two dual Credit programs at CCC?

CCC offers two dual credit programs for Oregon students: College Now (CTE courses) and Coastal Commitment (Lower Division Transfer courses)

Are there other programs for high school students wanting to earn college credit?

Yes, CCC offers a program called, “Simultaneous Enrollment” for Oregon high school students who attend college classes scheduled on the college campus. CCC also offers a program for Wahington State high school students called, “Running Start.”

What is the cost for Dual Credit Classes?

There is no tuition for credits you earn through dual credit from Clatsop Community College. There may be additional school fees, textbooks, or supplies fees for different classes. Check with your counselor and /or instructor for more information about waiving fees.

If I have completed Dual Credit courses and they are on my CCC transcript, will I have to go through CCC’s admissions process when I am ready to be an on-campus student at CCC?

Yes, you will have to formally do the admissions process.

There are 3 steps to admissions at CCC.

1. Complete the online admissions application for certificate or degree seeking students.
2. Submit high school transcript with online application.
3. Complete online orientation and advising sessions.
4. Our admissions department at CCC will help you every step of the way!

Do I have to attend CCC after high school to take advantage of the Dual Credit credits I have earned while in high school?

No, you can have your official transcript sent to the college of your choice. Of course, we hope that CCC is one of your top considerations for post-secondary education.

Can Dual Credit courses be transferred to another college?

The courses you take are transferable to public college and universities in the State of Oregon and transferable to colleges and universities throughout the United State.

You need to check with the Admissions Office at the college you are considering attending to learn how the dual credit course meets their degree program criteria.

Can students with an IEP participate in the Dual Credit program?

Check with your counselor to learn how IEP and 504 students are accommodated. The accommodation is determined by the high school and accommodation may be appropriate for dual credit classes, as well.

Where can I find other College Now or Coastal Commitment courses that may be offered at my high school?

Check with your high school counselor and/or instructor about the availability and schedule. Additional information can be found on the CCC Dual Credit page.

Are dual Credit classes graded, or can I take them as a pass/ no-pass grade?

The State of Oregon, Higher Education Commission has established an expectation that dual credit classes are most transferable when they are graded. The grade protects the integrity of the work you accomplish in the class. If you earn an “A” or a “B” in the class, then the grade transfers exactly as you were graded.

Does taking Dual Credit Classes impact future Financial Aid requests?

Continued eligibility for student financial aid requires that students work to make “Satisfactory Academic Progress” (SAP) in their college classes. This is a fancy way of saying that students need to show academic progress and good grades in all (or most of) your college classes to remain fully eligible for Financial Aid. The legal way of stating this is that there are federal laws, regulations and college policies that measure SAP by considering grades earned by the students, as well as the pace of progress made toward a degree. This information can get complicated fast, so we suggest that you discuss this further with your high school counselor. You can also contact CCC’s Financial Aid Department at 503- 338-2322 or at finad@clatsopcc.edu. Understanding SAP is important if you want to qualify for financial aid in the future.

FERPA Privacy Policy

Student records are protected by the Federal Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), Oregon Law, and CCC Policy. Information about student access to education records and protection of education records is available from the CCC Registrar.

Under FERPA and without the student permission, CCC cannot release:

- Financial records
- Grades and GPA information
- Class schedules, times, locations
- Personal identifying information such as your SSN and birthdate.
